Building Blocks of Literacy and KtO

The purpose of Keystones to
Opportunity (KtO) is to improve literacy
learning outcomes for all students. KtO
provides districts with the structure to build
and implement a literacy plan that ensures
consistency and leads to student success.
Building Blocks for Literacy provides the
foundational skills that are essential to
initiating and developing reading capacity.

Building Blocks for Literacy includes the following components which provide students with age-appropriate, explicit, evidence-based, and systematic instruction.

- Oral Language
- Phonological Awareness
- Phonics and Word Study
- Accuracy and Fluency
- Vocabulary
- Comprehension
- Writing

Ensuring student success requires much more than an effective reading program. Most importantly, it requires building teacher capacity in literacy knowledge through rigorous, ongoing professional development which is provided through KtO.

Literacy includes reading, writing, listening, speaking, viewing, visually representing, and thinking in order to communicate and contribute to society. (IRA, 2010)

Building Blocks of Literacy Connections

Building Blocks of Literacy connects with many of the other literacy efforts within this initiative. The DIBELS Next and GRADE assessments will provide valuable data in making instructional decisions about how best to meet the needs of all students. Learners with special needs and English language learners need additional instruction, support, and reinforcement in the components of effective reading instruction. Since not all students learn in the same way, **UDL** will provide clear understanding about how best to design instruction tailored to the way that students learn best. Family engagement plays a crucial role in reading development that begins with oral language. Schools need to communicate clearly with families and work together as students make the transition from "learning to read" to "reading to learn".



The Pennsylvania Comprehensive Literacy Plan

- Literacy is a critical foundation for all learning and serves as a "keystone" for opportunity and success. (Guiding Principle 1)
- Evidence-based decision-making must be at the heart of all instructional decisions related to literacy development. (Guiding Principle 4)
- Oral language is the foundation for literacy development. Speaking and listening are the tools of communication that become the basis for the written word. (Essential Element 2)
- Fostering engagement and academic resiliency are keys to developing literate students. (Essential Element 4)
- Differentiation of instruction is key to enhancing students' ability to learn. (Essential Element 5)

1.1 Foundational Skills (Pre K - 5).....

Students gain a working knowledge of concepts of print, alphabetic principle, and other basic conventions.

1.2 Reading Informational Text

Students read, understand, and respond to informational text – with an emphasis on comprehension, vocabulary acquisition, and making connections.

1.3 Reading Literature

Students read and respond to works of literature - with emphasis on comprehension vocabulary acquisition, making connections among ideas and between texts with focus on textual evidence.

1.4 Writing

Students write for different purposes and audiences.

1.5 Speaking and Listening

Students present appropriately in formal speaking situations, listen critically, and respond intelligently as individuals or in group discussions. (www.pdesas.org)
